School of Law

The School of Law

Established in 1899, the School of Law at the University of Leeds is currently recognised as one of the leading law schools in the UK. It has received consistently high rankings in the *Times* and *Guardian* league tables and very good scores in the Government Research Assessment exercises. Since 2000 the School has grown by almost 50% in both staffing and financial turnover.

The school's ambition is to be internationally recognized as a leader in its field by 2015, and to be ranked as one of the top ten research-intensive law schools in the UK by 2010. It has a strong research and teaching profile and is highly committed to research intensive teaching. All senior academic staff teach in their specialist research areas at postgraduate and where possible undergraduate levels. The School currently has a total of over 60 members of staff (including 12 Professors). It also has just under 1000 students with about 800 at undergraduate level (650 on the LLB scheme and 150 on the BA in Criminal Justice and Criminology) and about 160 postgraduates, over 30 of which are research students.

In 2006 the University approved a development plan for Law entailing strategic investment in five new Chairs (4.2 *fte*), and a £16m new building (£11m dedicated to Law) due for completion by 2011. The new Law building will provide research infrastructure to enhance quality and expand capacity through innovative facilities including: [1] *the Legal Research Centre* with work-stations and document storage in a communal setting to accommodate research officers, research assistants, and visiting scholars (numbers planned to double by 2015); [2] *the Law Graduate Centre* with similar facilities for research and taught post-graduate students (numbers planned to expand 25-50% by 2015); and [3] *the Law Technology Laboratory* to support collaborative research projects and postgraduate activity, especially with the Leeds Informatics Institute and external institutions such as the Courtroom21 project in the William & Mary Law School, Virginia, and Australian law schools pursuing the same agenda.

The greater majority the School's research falls within four specialist research Centres in Business Law, Criminal Justice, European Law and Policy, and the newly formed Centre for International Governance. Through these Centres the School also provides range of exciting taught postgraduate degrees with LLM and MA schemes in Criminal Justice Studies and Criminal Law, International Business Law, International Trade Law, International Law, International Human Rights, Cyberlaw, European Legal Studies. The School of Law is keen to encourage links at both theoretical and practical levels where appropriate between its various projects on governance.

Staff

The School is a part of the Faculty of Education, Social Sciences and Law. Its current establishment of over 40 academic staff is set out in the attached Appendix. As well as the academic staff, there are in addition eleven secretarial staff and one computing technician. There is excellent provision for travel to conferences and for study leave, as well as very manageable teaching loads. The University promotes professional development in areas of academic life such as teaching and research and offers a wide range of training opportunities, including a Certificate in Learning and Teaching in Higher Education for new lecturers.

Teaching

The annual intake of around 300 home and EU students for our undergraduate degrees means that we are large enough to offer a broad range of optional courses, yet small enough to maintain an informal and friendly atmosphere. Most of the undergraduate students (around 160) register for the three year LL.B. scheme. There are over 2,000 UCCA applications each year for the LL.B., and our entry standards are high (AAA). Our students come from a range of backgrounds, with about one quarter from overseas. As well as the usual core courses, a broad range of specialist courses are offered. We also offer undergraduate degree courses in Law/Accounting and Law/Management, Law/French and Criminal Justice and Criminology. Some teaching is also provided in other Departmental areas (including Accountancy, Management, Communications Studies, Environmental Studies, and Medicine).

We maintain SOCRATES arrangements with universities in Belgium, Holland, France, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and Germany, and students from most of these institutions will be in

the School in the coming year. In addition, there is a long-standing link with the University of Maine (Le Mans) involving an annual staff/student seminar. Outside Europe, the School has links with American Law Schools, and many members of staff have spent periods of leave to undertake teaching and research in the USA in pursuance of well-established international links.

At postgraduate level, we operate several taught postgraduate schemes, especially within the fields of our specialist Centres. Thus, the School offers postgraduate Mastership and/diploma level taught courses in Business Law, Criminal Justice Studies, Cyberlaw, European Legal Studies, and Human Rights. There are also long-established two year accelerated degree schemes at LL.B. and LL.M. levels for graduates of other disciplines. In addition to the large number of taught postgraduate students, the Law School has a sizeable population of research students. The Law School encourages applications from those interested in pursuing research in all legal and socio-legal fields of study. Postgraduate research students are accommodated in a Law Graduate Centre within our main building.

Accommodation and resources

The School is attractively located in a number of large Victorian terrace houses at the western edge of the University campus. As well as containing staff offices and seminar rooms, the buildings house a newly-refurbished, large Moot Court Room and a Postgraduate Suite. The extensive Law collection is held within the excellent Brotherton Library, including a European Documentation Centre, which is a CURL library and has a full collection across business and management, the social sciences and humanities.

The School has invested heavily in recent years in high specification computing equipment. The School is networked to the University as a whole and, through it to facilities available through the Internet. Each member of staff has their own networked PC and printer. There is also free access to databases such as LEXIS and Westlaw. An excellent range of IT training courses are available within the University.

Our location in Leeds provides a distinct advantage which gives energy to our work. The University of Leeds is part of the fastest growing city and legal professional community in the UK. With its continued commercial prosperity in areas of finance, business and media, it has great employment potential. This is all complemented by a vibrant mix of culture, commerce and style. Leeds has been voted as one of the top three places to shop in the UK by an independent survey, and offers a huge range of shops and stores to suit all tastes. You are also never far away from the impressive Yorkshire Dales with its awe-inspiring scenery and the Dales' huge selection of outdoor activities and pursuits. Yorkshire is also home to the ancient city of York with historical attractions such as the Viking and Roman heritage, the Minster, Shambles and selection of Museums. 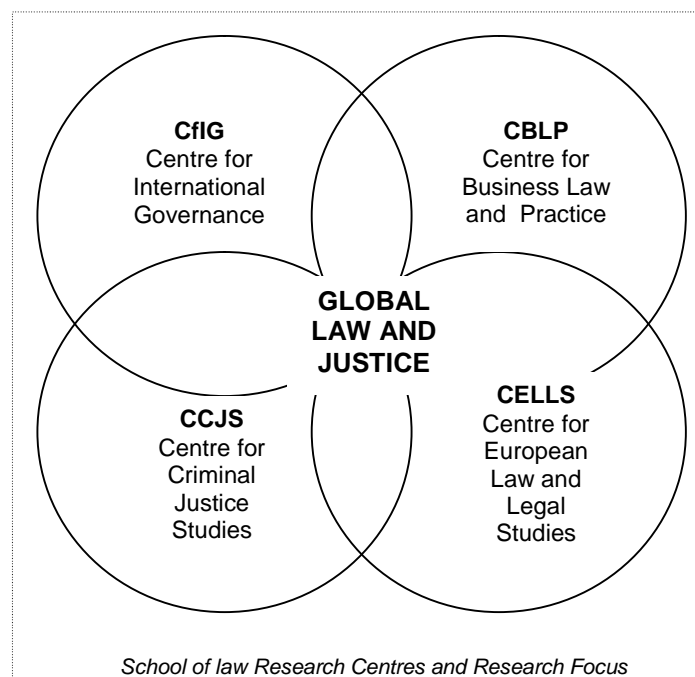
Research

The School fosters and promotes research in all major fields of legal study. Our excellence is represented by our national and international research standing and also by lively programmes of seminars and colloquia as well as by links with policy makers and by hosting visiting scholars. We are a broadly based School, and no single approach to research or teaching is imposed. In 2006 the School adopted as a unifying theme and a driver for further research development a strategic focus on Global Law and Justice, in recognition of the growing internationalisation of research agendas in legal, socio-legal, and criminal justice studies. Research is organized within four Centres, all of which are recognized by the University:

- Centre for Criminal Justice Studies (CCJS)
- Centre for European Law and Legal Studies (CELLS)
- Centre for Business Law and Practice (CBLP)
- Centre for International Governance (CfIG)

CfIG was launched in 2006, bringing together a number of staff from diverse subject areas within Law and from other disciplines to explore aspects of international governance, including Public

International Law, Private International Law, Human Rights Law, and Constitutional Law. CfIG includes research previously undertaken within the Human Rights Research Unit (HRRU) while the work of the Cyberlaw Research Unit (CRU) has been incorporated in CCJS.



Law staff are also members of the Centres for British Government and for Democratization Studies, located within School of Politics (POLIS). In addition the School has links with a variety of other departmental areas, including Earth Sciences (including Environmental Studies), Medicine, Modern Languages and Business. We also contribute to the Centre for Interdisciplinary Gender Studies and to a number of projects related to social and family mobility.



> **Centre for Criminal Justice Studies (CCJS)** — <http://www.law.leeds.ac.uk/crimjust/>

The Centre was established in 1987 to pursue research into criminal justice systems and criminological issues. It has since grown in critical mass and become recognised as one of the leading criminological centres of its genre with an established international profile. The Centre excels in the production of research that is empirically rich, conceptually sophisticated and policy relevant. Research is interdisciplinary and often comparative in its insights to certain key criminal justice issues. Those working within the CCJS have established international reputations in the broad field of criminal justice policy research, especially in the areas of policing, crime prevention, victims, youth justice, terrorism, miscarriages of justice, cyber-crimes and the supervision of offenders. We also have strengths in criminal law and procedure and criminological theory. Cyberlaw is a developing field comprising a group of colleagues focusing on issues of national and international (including criminal law) regulation and governance of electronic media and cyberspace. Staff combine commitments to quantitative and qualitative methods in empirical

research, as well as doctrinal legal analysis. The Centre has been awarded external research grants of approximately £2.5 million since 2000 from a variety of funding sources. This includes some recent large scale awards from the Ministry of Justice and the Nuffield Foundation (i.e. £200,000 plus). It has also attracted a number of prestigious smaller awards including the ESRC, AhRC, European Commission, Nuffield Foundation, Joseph Rowntree Foundation and Leverhulme Trust.

As well as a BA programme in Criminology and Criminal Justice, the CCJS runs a number of post-graduate programmes in Criminal Justice, Criminology and Criminal Law. It hosts an active seminar series and an Annual CCJS Lecture. The Centre regularly hosts national and international conferences such as the British Society of Criminology Conference in July 2005. Centre staff are well represented on the editorial boards of top criminology and criminal justice journals.

The Centre is a member of the *Groupe Européen de Recherches sur les Normativités* (GERN), an international research network funded by the French CNRS, and is actively developing its international partnerships through the World University Network (WUN). It is a major partner in a European Commission Framework 6 funded 'co-ordination action' project, entitled CRIMPREV, involving more than 30 institutions representing 11 European countries.

In 2005 the University of Leeds recognised the CCJS as one of its key 'peaks of research excellence', the only one within the Faculty of Education, Social Sciences and Law. The Centre aims to continue to expand its work and reputation particularly in the international arena while extending its knowledge transfer links through regional, national and global partnerships.

The Centre for European Law and Legal Studies developed out of the for Centre for the Study of Law and Policy in Europe, which itself evolved from the Centre for European Law formally constituted in 1993 to promote research activity in European Legal Studies and to develop wider interest through research projects, seminars and conferences. Today, CELLS consists of 11 full time academic staff plus PhD researchers and other researchers working on specific projects. In accordance with the Centre Constitution, CELLS is governed by an executive committee (Michael Cardwell, Anna Lawson and Peter Vincent-Jones) and its director (Dagmar Schiek). The Centre is a partner in the University of Leeds' Jean Monnet European Centre of Excellence, thus offering institutional links to political sciences, economics and media studies.

CELLS is committed to high quality research, not only in doctrinal aspects of European law, but also in the wider field of European Legal Studies, which extends to research themes involving interdisciplinary content. CELLS research is organised in three focal points: "European and International Equality Law", "Governance and Legitimacy at European Level" and "Economic and Social Constitutionalism as Europe's Societal Base".

Since its re-inauguration in August 2007, the Centre has attracted three new research projects in the fields of equality law (Academic Network of European Disability experts (ANED).funded by the EU Commission, PI Anna Lawson), Consumer law (Marie Curie project project 'Credit & Debt: Protection of vulnerable consumers in Private law, PI Mel Kenny) and Economic and Social Constitutionalism (Jean Monnet Multi-Lateral Research Group, PI Dagmar Schiek) The Centre will also launch the Second European Conference on Multidimensional Equality Law in March 2009 (Dagmar Schiek and Anna Lawson) and a conference on WTO Law and EU agricultural policy in that same month in London together with UCL (Michael Cardwell).

These projects demonstrate that CELLS members are well networked all over Europe and world-wide. In order to enable research led teaching, CELLS also hosts the relaunch of the School of Law's LL.M programme in European Law (focused on the theme Socio-Economic Integration of Europe in a Globalising World).

CELLS strives to maintain the dynamic mode of attracting new projects, aspiring to enhance its international and national appreciation towards recognition as a centre of excellence for socio-legal research under the umbrella theme "EU law and governance towards social justice"

> **Centre for Business Law and Practice** — www.law.leeds.ac.uk/business

The Centre exists to promote the study of all areas of Business Law. It seeks to promote doctrinal, theoretical and applied (including empirical) research, and to develop contacts and enhance mutual understanding and awareness between the academic world and the worlds of business and legal practice. The results of its work are disseminated as widely as possible by publishing monographs, articles and pamphlets as well as by holding seminars with both in-house and outside speakers. The supervision and instruction of postgraduate students is one of the Centre's principal activities. There are more than a dozen full-time doctoral students working within relevant fields. In addition, the Centre offers various taught postgraduate schemes, including its main and most successful programme, an LLM in International Business Law. The Centre for Business Law and Practice affords a strong and stimulating environment within the School, while, beyond the Centre, the city of Leeds is the premier location for Business and Commercial Law outside of London. > **Centre for International Governance (CfIG)** — www.law.leeds.ac.uk/CFiG

The School of Law established the Centre for International Governance (CfIG) in 2006, to sit alongside the other three Centres. CfIG is an integral part of the Law Development Plan which seeks to develop a distinctive international identity for the School of Law through its strategic focus upon Global Law and Justice.

CfIG brings together a number of existing and newly appointed staff from diverse subject areas within the School of Law and from other disciplines to pursue research activities in specific aspects of international governance, focusing on the range of legal and other processes and institutions that manage relationships of inter-dependence among nation states and regulatory authorities, non-state bodies, and civil society actors. While the new Centre provides a natural base for enhancing research capacity in Public International Law, its wider remit also includes Private International and Human Rights Law. The thematic areas so far identified for development within CfIG are: (i) international governance and constitutionalism; (ii) international governance and markets; and (iii) international governance and human rights.

CfIG was formally launched on 15th February 2007 with an inaugural lecture by Prof. Ian Brownlie, QC, FBA, CBE. External speakers in the first year of the Centre's program included Fabian Hamilton MP and Clare Short MP. In March 2007 CfIG hosted a half-day conference, 'The Constitutionalisation of International Law: Skeptical Voices', addressed by Sir Michael Wood, KCMG (Senior Fellow of the Lauterpacht Centre for International Law), David Anderson (recently judge on the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea), and Prof. Colin Warbrick (Birmingham University).
